A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

From a very early age I was captivated with live theater and movie musicals. The idea of complex storytelling appealed to me greatly as an imaginative, introspective and introverted youth. Theater and music helped me find myself and my unique voice and message in the world. I was particularly fascinated with the darker characters immediately and transformed my bedroom and my world into a safe lair of creativity- sparked significantly by the story and lead character in The Phantom of the Opera, a role I played in many places, for many years and still continue to explore. This journey led me deeper down the "rabbit hole" into C.S.Lewis, Victor Hugo, Edgar Allen Poe, Bram Stoker and Grimm's Fairy Tales. These stories furthered my curiosity into a double minor or

Literature and Philosophy. As a history buff and a born and bred New Yorker who lived in New York City for over 13 years, I have also always been drawn to anything steeped in New England history. As an actor, I have been thrilled to have made a national career in theater and opera, exploring darker and more mis-understood characters and the intricacies of the human condition.

Enter Little Shop of Horrors.
Of course my first obsession with this musical was the 1986 movie with Rick Moranis, Ellen Green and Steve Martin- a fun and true rendition in it's own right but tied up with a bow in a happy Hollywood ending. A singing plant puppet from outer space? Count me in! As a small homage to one of my idols- Jim Henson and Frank Oz, I wanted

to "try my hand" at bringing Audrey II's puppets to life and then go one step further as we explored the art of theatrical movement as Audrey II grows and matures.

The Original Broadway versionthe version you will see here today- speaks much deeper to our choices and humanity. The story, more like a Grimm fable, carries the message that we can be undone by our circumstances if we let them reign. Spoiler Alert: it does not end so happily. Our message and what I hope you will take away from my "vision" is that Human Ambition is a monster planted in a world that is ripe for the picking- that it eats even the purest of us whole if we feed it. As human beings in our modern society we are so often grasping for the "unattainable"...and sometimes the thing we are truly grasping for is overlooked as it is covered with the distracting vines of putting our energies into the exact wrong things. Do we really need four 75" Plasma Tys or 7 cars...or millions of dollars to live a happy and fulfilled existence? Do we really need to feed these desires? Or do we all just truly long for a tv dinner Somewhere that's Green with the ones we love? Maybe we have what we need before us, if we just nurture what is pure and honest? These questions could not be more relevant today. As we negotiate

our lives after this Global Pandemic the world and our lives will be changed forever and maybe it is Mother Nature's way of guiding us back to what is pure and honest.

At the very least, Little Shop's message gets us thinking...

There are so many beautiful and simply poignant songs in this show, written by Disney's favorite composer Alan Menken and lyricist Howard Ashman in their earlier days, and the dialogue is funny and sweet while still remaining sincere.

Set in 1950 Manhattan's Lower East side I also find, as many of us do, a nod to our American immigrant heritage and the post war economic struggle and unbalanced class system that developed in the Skid Rows of our large cities at the time. The strain of those conditions also have a large part in WHY our characters make the dramatic choices they do. I hope today you will laugh, cry and ponder with me as we watch this truly heartfelt and timeless story of the human condition.

And remember..."Don't Feed the Plants!" Welcome back to LIVE Theater!

He has played for the SF Symphony under Maestro Seiji Ozawa, for the San Francisco Opera and Ballet, music directed for the Lamplighters, Pocket Opera, the Summer Song Opera program, and The San Francisco Boys Chorus. At Davies Symphony Hall, he conducted the acclaimed Edith Piaf show by Rachel Bitton. He received his BMus at Oberlin Conservatory and his MMA from Yale University School of Music. He received the Mr. Holland's Opus award (founded by the Henry Mancini family) at Carnegie Hall in 2006 for his outstanding teaching of music. He frequently records at Skywalker Ranch for movies and video games, and it is entirely possible he's the guy playing piano on your ringtones. William Gregg

Previous Theatre Arts Department Chair. He came to Mars Hill University from the New American Theater in Rockford, Illinois, where he was the producing artistic director. He has

directed many productions all over the country, in New York City, Washington, DC, Minneapolis, and Southern Appalachian Repertory Theatre. He has previously served as Artistic Director for Theatre Virginia in Richmond, where he staged Harvey, The Mystery of Irma Vep, and Terra Nova (which won best director, best production, best scenic design, and best supporting actor from Richmond critics). At the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis, Bill worked as production stage manager and assistant director to Artistic Director, Liviu Ciulei. Among Bill's directing repertoire are such plays as Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Steel Magnolias, Zelda, The Glass Menagerie, Peter Pan, Grace and Glorie, The Importance of Being Earnest, Always, Patsy Cline, and Pump Boys and Dinettes. In Bill's first year at Mars Hill College, he taught several classes and directed the theatre arts department's production of The Little Foxes. Bill was also the Producing Artistic Director of SART from 2000-2015. Bill is married to actress, singer, and RN, Elizabeth Aiello. They are the proud parents of Cameron Michael, Lucas James, and Emelia Anne, Bill holds a B.A. in Theatre from Mars Hill College and an M.F.A. in Drama/Acting and Directing from the University of Virginia.



C. Robert Jones

Previous Theatre Arts Department Chair and the founder of the Musical Theatre Degree Program. He came to Mars Hill University after a four-year stint as Artistic Director of The Little Theatre in

Savannah Georgia (26 shows), and five years as Chair and Founder of the Theatre Arts Department at Gardner-Webb University. While in Savannah, he founded the Little Theatre's Drama School, started its Theatre Guild, and directed the theatre's first play for children. As Gardner-Webb University was going from Junior College to Senior College status, he built the four-year theatre arts degree program, and in the first senior graduating class saw five students achieve their BA's in Theatre Arts. Starting his theatre work first as an actor in Washington, DC, C. Robert moved to directing and playwriting. He has written about fifty plays covering the wide spectrum of theatre from children's plays to mystery plays, to romantic comedies, to serious dramas. He is also a composer. His musical, Rivals, which premiered at the University was a winner of the David B. Marshall Musical Theatre Award from the University of Michigan. His musical Mandy Lou was produced by SART, and the University produced his musical Treasures at its Sesquicentennial Celebration in 2006. He is author of three one- person shows about such diverse personalities as Jenny Lind, Bert Williams, and Stephen Foster. C. Robert was honored in 2011 with the Robert Chesley Foundation Playwriting Award for his plays, The Love Quartette and The Catbird Seat. That award also included a three-month writing residency at the Helene Wurlitzer Foundation in Taos, New Mexico where he wrote a theatrical memoir, I Like It Here! His plays have been performed in all the forty-eight contiguous states and in Canada. Among those which have brought exceptional pleasure are *The Clown* (for children), Chiaroscuro (Nocturne), which was a winner in Theatre Memphis's national play search, and Taking A Chance On Love, SART's ScriptFest Winner in 2005. His latest musical (Broadway Babies, 2016) is in development. C. Robert is also the author of the four-volume children's short story series, Lanky Tales.



Neil St. Clair

Previous Theatre Arts Department Chair. He came to Mars Hill after 17 years as Chair of the Division of Communications and the Director of Theatre at Howard Payne University in Texas. He holds a B.M. in Music and a B.A. in Theatre Arts

from Mars Hill College. After graduation he completed an internship at the Arena Stage in Washington, D.C., and then worked as a professional actor, stage manager, and music director for four and a half years. In 1981, he received an M.F.A. from the University of Houston and served an internship at Houston Grand Opera. He has completed his requirements (all but dissertation) for a Ph.D. in Fine Arts from Texas Tech University. St. Clair also served as Director of Theatre at Alief-Elsik High School, a 5A school in the Houston area from 1981-1983. In 1995, Neil won the "Outstanding Faculty Member Award" for Howard Payne University. In 2011, he was awarded The Mars Hill College Faculty/Staff Heritage Award for dedicated and long-term service to the College. Mr. St. Clair began his relationship with The Southern Appalachian Repertory Theatre in 1978 and through the years worked as an actor, stage manager, and director. He also served as Production Manager from 2000-2009. Neil twice taught theatre courses in Oxford, England for the World Class Oxford Program, a consortium between Howard Payne University and two other Texas universities.
